Confession of Sin

¶ The Officiant says

DEARLY BELOVED, we have come together in the presence of Almighty God our heavenly Father, to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his holy Word, and to ask, for ourselves and on behalf of others, those things that are necessary for our life and our salvation. And so that we may prepare ourselves in heart and mind to worship him, let us kneel in silence, and with penitent and obedient hearts confess our sins, that we may obtain forgiveness by his infinite goodness and mercy.

Almighty and most merciful Father,
we have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep,
we have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts,
we have offended against thy holy laws,

spare thou those who confess their faults,
restore thou those who are penitent,
according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord;
and grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake,

to the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

The First Lesson

ISAIAH 5:1-7

LET ME SING for my beloved a love song concerning his vineyard:
My beloved had a vineyard
on a very fertile hill.
He digged it and cleared it of stones,

and hewed out a wine vat in it;
and he looked for it to yield grapes,

The Second Lesson

MATTHEW 21:33-46

JESUS SAID, “Hear another parable. There was a householder who planted a vineyard, and set a hedge around it, and dug a wine press in it, and built a tower, and let it out to tenants, and went into another country. When the season of fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants, to get his fruit; and the tenants took his servants and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other servants, more than the first; and they did the same to them. Afterward he sent his son to them, saying, ‘They will respect my son.’ But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, ‘This is the heir; come, let us kill him and have his inheritance.’ And they took him and cast him out of the vineyard, and killed him. When therefore the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?” They said to him, “He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and let out the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the fruits in their seasons.” Jesus said to them, “Have you never read in the scriptures: ‘The very stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner; this was the Lord’s doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes’? Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a nation producing the fruits of it.” When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they perceived that he was speaking about them. But when they tried to arrest him, they feared the multitudes, because they held him to be a prophet.

The Blessing

GO FORTH INTO THE WORLD IN PEACE; be of good courage; hold fast to that which is good; render to no one evil for evil; strengthen the fainthearted; support the weak; help the afflicted; honour everyone; and the blessing of God Almighty, ✠ the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be amongst you, and remain with you always. *¶ People Amen.*

Liturgical Music

Giuseppe Tartini (1692-1770), a Venetian by birth, spent his early years in the monastery in Padua. Unhappy with his abilities at playing the violin, he withdrew from the monastery to devote his time to practicing his instrument. Tartine is the first known owner of a violin made by the famous instrument maker Antonio Stradivari. His *Air*, which begins today's liturgy is typical of his style.

The familiar hymn, *Hail, thou once despised Jesus*, was penned by an English Methodist minister, John Bakewell, and by Martin Madan who served as chaplain to the Lock Hospital, an institution for the "restoration of unhappy females." The hymn can best be described as theology in rhyme.

Peter Hallock served for many years as the musician at the Cathedral of St. Mark in Seattle where he launched the movement for the rediscovery of Compline in the Episcopal Church. His short anthem, *Thy word is a lantern*, is a lovely setting that couples a cello solo with the words of the psalmist.

Today's liturgy closes with Johann Sebastian Bach's (1685-1750) *Three-Part Sinfonia III* in D major. Originally for keyboard, it is here transcribed for three double-reed instruments.
