Opening Sentences

Officiant The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him. Habakkuk 2:20

Confession of Sin

¶ The Officiant says

EARLY BELOVED, we have come together in the presence of Almighty God our heavenly Father, to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his holy Word, and to ask, for ourselves and on behalf of others, those things that are necessary for our life and our salvation. And so that we may prepare ourselves in heart and mind to worship him, let us kneel in silence, and with penitent and obedient hearts confess our sins, that we may obtain forgiveness by his infinite goodness and mercy.

¶ Officiant and People, all kneeling

Almighty and most merciful Father, we have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep, we have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts, we have offended against thy holy laws, we have left undone those things which we ought to have done, and we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us.

But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, spare thou those who confess their faults, restore thou those who are penitent, according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord; and grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake, that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

¶ The Officiant alone stands and says

The Almighty and merciful Lord grant you absolution $\frac{1}{4}$ and remission of all your sins, true repentance, amendment of life, and the grace and consolation of his Holy Spirit. $\frac{1}{4}$ *People Amen.*

The Lessons

The First Lesson

I THESSALONIANS 4:13-18

But we would not have you ignorant, brethren, concerning those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, shall not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the archangel's call, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first; then we who are alive, who are left, shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air; and so we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore comfort one another with these words.

The Second Lesson Matthew 25:1-13

HEN THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN shall be compared to ten maidens who took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. For when the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, they all slumbered and slept. But at midnight there was a cry, "Behold, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those maidens rose and trimmed their lamps. And the foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "Perhaps there will not be enough for us and for you; go rather to the dealers and buy for yourselves." And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went in with him to the marriage feast; and the door was shut. Afterward the other maidens came also, saying, "Lord, Lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly, I say to you, I do not know you." Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

Liturgical Music

Percy Whitlock (1903-1946) lived a short life and was a master of the miniature form. A student of Charles Villiers Stanford and Ralph Vaughan Williams, he pushed the boundaries of his mentor's musical vocabulary to find his voice in lush, chromatic harmonies. His *Folk Tune*, heard this morning, is drawn from his *Five Short Pieces* for organ and was orchestrated by Robert Lehman. It is played by the ARIA Chamber orchestra.

The haunting hymn, Let all mortal flesh keep silence, is drawn from one of the most ancient liturgies of the Church, traditionally ascribed to St. James, the brother of Jesus. Its first extant form exists from the mid fourth century in both Greek and Syriac. Its brooding melody helps to conjure images of the "last things."

Charles Wood (1866-1926) was an Irish composer and organist who spent most of his career at Cambridge University and at the Royal College of Music where his pupils included both Ralph Vaughan Williams and Herbert Howells. His short anthem, *Never weather-beaten sail*, sung this morning, is not widely known but, nevertheless, is a gem of the repertoire that sets the famous words of Thomas Campion.

John Alcock (1715-1806), composer of this morning's closing music, *Siciliano*, was a lesser-known student of John Stanley at St. Paul's Cathedral and composer. The details known of his life are included in his semi-autobiographical novel, *The Life of Miss Fanny Brown* published under the pseudonym John Piper in 1771.



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
