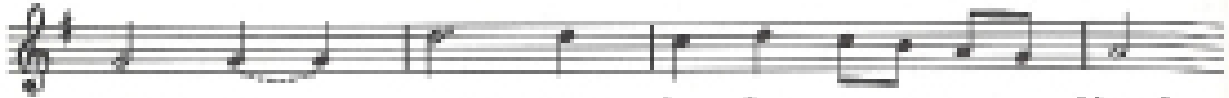

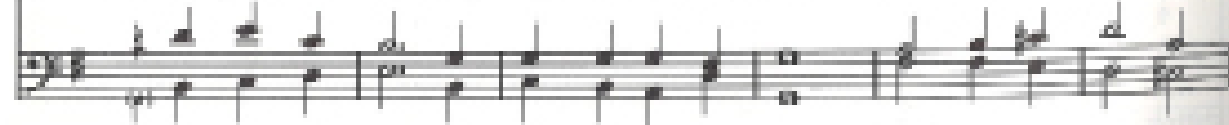

4. Sing — praise, then, for all who here sought and here found him,


For the saints who be - fore us have found their re - ward;


