



GENESIS 15:1-12, 17-18

FTER THESE THINGS THE WORD OF THE LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Fear not, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what wilt thou give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Elie'zer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "Behold, thou hast given me no offspring; and a slave born in my house will be my heir." And behold, the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; your own son shall be your heir." And he brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven, and number the stars, if you are able to number them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and he reckoned it to him as righteousness. And he said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chalde'ans, to give you this land to possess." This Morning's Liturgy

[†] Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors worn at The Church of St. Michael & St. George are drawn from colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the Church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season of Lent are oxblood and unbleached linen representing penitence and fasting.

† O Gott, du frommer Gott, BWV767 is clearly within the precepts of his mentors, encompassing also certain French elements. You find ostinato figures supporting either a plain or more ornamented chorale tune along with a contrapuntal texture developing an incisive rhythmic motive.

† Abram's Call is a modern choral interpretation of how the true voice of God may be delivered to our mortal ears. Originating from nothing, built of swirling then structured voices, this anthem aims to paint the experience of Abraham as his path and purpose is angelically described.

[†] Lotti's motet *Vere languores nostros* is scored for three-part treble voices which include dissonances between the voices that is found in all of his compositions. His composition style allows the text to prevail through the harmonies and wonderful dissonances.
