The hymns sung at The Church of St. Michael & St. George are drawn from The Hymnal 1982 of The Episcopal Church. New to the Hymnal 1982, this hymn is solidly based on the biblical narrative of Christ's baptism in the Jordan River. Verse 5 is a prayer that we might go forth to be disciples with the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Old Testament Lesson


Behold my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my Spirit upon him, he will bring forth justice to the nations. He will not cry or lift up his voice, or make it heard in the street; a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. He will not fail or be discouraged till he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his law. Thus says God, the Lord, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread forth the earth and what comes from it, who gives breath to the people upon it and spirit to those who walk in it: "I am the Lord, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept you; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from

The New Testament Lesson

ACTS 10:34-43

nd Peter opened his mouth and said: "Truly I perceive that God shows no partiality, but in every nation any one who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the word which he sent to Israel, preaching good news of peace by Jesus Christ (he is Lord of all), the word which was proclaimed throughout all Judea, beginning from Galilee after the baptism which John preached: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. And we are witnesses to all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and made him manifest; not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. And he commanded us to preach to the people, and to testify that he is the one ordained by God to be judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness that every one who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Hymn at the Sequence 121

Written in 1973, this text was composed in response to the need of the new Book of Common Prayer and its renewed emphasis on Baptism as a public rite. It is rich in references to the Gospel narratives of the Baptism of the Lord and incorporates references to the Baptismal formula found in the Book of Common Prayer.

The Baptismal Covenant

Celebrant Do you believe in God the Father? *People* I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. Celebrant Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? *People* I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. Celebrant Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? *People* I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, 4 and the life everlasting. Celebrant Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers? People I will, with God's help. Celebrant Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? People I will, with God's help. Celebrant Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? People I will, with God's help. Celebrant Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? People I will, with God's help.

Celebrant Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

People I will, with God's help.

Prayers for the Candidate

Thanksgiving over the Water

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¶ The Celebrant blesses the water, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

The Baptism

¶ The Candidate is presented by name to the Celebrant, or to an assisting Priest or Deacon, who pours water upon him, saying

N., I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. *¶ People* Amen.

N., for you Jesus Christ came into the world: for you he lived and showed God's love; for you he suffered the darkness of Calvary and cried at the last, "It is finished"; for you he triumphed over death and rose in newness of life; for you he ascended to reign at God's right hand. All this he did for you, little one, though you do not know it yet, we promise to teach you. And when you stumble and fall, we promise to pick you up. And so the word of Scripture is fulfilled: "We love because God loved us first."

¶ The Celebrant prays over the Newly Baptized, saying Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon this your servant the forgiveness of sin, and have raised him to the new life of grace. Sustain her, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give him an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. *¶ People* Amen.

¶ Then the Priest, marking on the forehead the sign of the cross, says

N., you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. g People Amen.

CelebrantLet us welcome the newly baptized.PeopleWe receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith
of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us
in his eternal priesthood.



Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing,

e acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you his body and blood, the acceptable sacrifice which brings salvation to the whole world, we praise you and we bless you.



Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend + upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, with Blessed Michael and All Angels, Blessed George, and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. *¶ All* AMEN.



The Invitation and Ministration of Communion

¶ Facing the people, the Celebrant says the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with Thanksgiving.

- **9** All Christians baptized with water in the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are welcome to receive Holy Communion. Proceed to the Altar Rail when invited by the Usher. To receive the Bread, extend your palms, crossed and upward; when offered the Chalice, please assist in guiding it. Those who do not wish to receive Holy Communion may come forward for a blessing; please indicate this to the Priest by crossing your arms over your chest.
- *¶* Holy Communion is distributed both at the High Altar and in St. Mary's Chapel. When directed, please follow the Ushers' direction. Those who are not able to come to the High Altar are always welcome to proceed to St. Mary's Chapel.

Hymn at the Retiring Procession 497 Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern

Dating from the 16th century, this chorale is known as the "Queen of the Chorales." It's original title was "A spiritual bridal song of the believing soul, concerning her Heavenly Bridegroom, founded on the 45th Psalm of the Prophet David." Though Lutheran in origin, this hymn is, perhaps, the quintessential Epiphany hymn sung throughout Christendom.

The flowers at the High Altar are given to the glory of God, and in memory of Nan Holmes by her daughters, and in thanksgiving for the marriage of Barry Kirk and Andrew Martin.

This Morning's Liturgy

[†] Colors play an important part of the worship of the Church. They change according to the seasons of the Church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The colors worn at the Church of St. Michael & St. George are drawn from colors worn in England before the Reformation. Today is the First Sunday after the Epiphany on which we mark the baptism of Jesus. The color white symbolizes purity, joy, light, and glory. It is worn for Feasts of Our Lord and Principal Feast Days, as well as for baptisms and sometimes funerals.

[†] The prelude this morning is one of J.S. Bach's choral-based preludes with the melody found in the pedal while the accompaniment is filled with both fast and constant sixteenth notes which depict the river Jordan. You will also hear a counter melody depicting water droplets symbolizing the Baptism of Christ. [‡] This light and lilting melody illustrates the story of the shepherds receiving the news of Christ's birth from the Angels with words uncommon even for Old English. The title word "enderes" derives from the Saxon endehenes, or "the last," and the falling terliterlow is an onomatopoetic rendering of the shepherd's horn playing. [†] The Latin motet sets two equal female voices in echoes and undulations in its beautiful sweeping phrases. The vowel-heavy and sonorous text celebrates the Holy Name of Jesus as a reflection of the Presentation/Candlemas.
