The Epistle 1 Corinthians 1:18-31

T OR THE WORD OF THE CROSS IS FOLLY TO THOSE WHO ARE → PERISHING, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the cleverness of the clever I will thwart." Where is the wise man? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men. For consider your call, brethren; not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth; but God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise, God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong, God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, so that no human being might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, whom God made our wisdom, our righteousness and sanctification and redemption; therefore, as it is written, "Let him who boasts, boast of the Lord."

Hymn at the Retiring Procession 542

Conceived as an Advent text, its eschatological and ecumenical overtones makes it equally appropriate as a hymn for the season of Epiphany as well as for the mission of the Church. It is paired with the tune St. Joan which supports the imagery and theme of the text in which Christ is described as "the world's true Light".

The flowers at the High Altar are given to the glory of God, and for the celebration for the year to come by Timothy Solberg & John Ansehl.

This Morning's Liturgy

- † Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors which bedeck the altar and are worn by the clergy are colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season after Epiphany are traditionally green. Green is a color that naturally reminds us of hope and growth, and reflects the seasons of Spring and Summer in the natural world. The Church clothes herself in green vestments to express her joyous, lively hope of the ever lovely and eternally lush meadows of the Kingdom of God.
- † Dietrich Buxtehude's famous *Praeludium in C* is a true classic representation of the German prelude style. Each section of music, with new thematic material, alternates from a free and improvisatory characteristic to a fugal section with strict counterpoint. † *Beati quorum via* (Psalm 119:1), a more restrained, pastoral prayer, Stanford's instrumental treatment is manifested in the skilful sonata structure whose two contrasting thematic subjects are defined by the opening words ('Beati quorum via') and the secondary phrase ('qui ambulant in lege Domini'). Both ideas, in the recapitulation, are subsequently reworked with consummate legerdemain. † Sir Henry Walford Davies was a chorister at St George's Chapel, Windsor. As a student at the Royal College of Music his peers were Parry and Stanford and at the age of twenty-five he was appointed as a teacher of counterpoint at that college. Although his music has been described as 'sentimental', the composer captures the mood perfectly in his short anthem Blessed are the pure in heart.
