SURREY

The hymns sung at The Church of St. Michael & St. George are drawn from The Hymnal 1982 of The Episcopal Church. Probably from the 9th century, this famous text is associated with Pentecost – the gift of the Spirit – and existed in 35 different translations by the early 20th century. I fed you with milk, not solid food; for you were not ready for it; and even yet you are not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For while there is jealousy and strife among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving like ordinary men? For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apol'los," are you not

merely men? What then is Apol'los? What is Paul? Servants through whom you believed, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apol'los watered, but God gave the growth. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. He who plants and he who waters are equal, and each shall receive his wages according to his labor. Building on the theme of community, this hymn addresses the meaning of Holy Communion. Note the singular "I" at the beginning of the hymn which gives way to the plural "We" as the hymn progresses, thus building solidly on the foundation of the Christian understanding of community.

The Gospel Matthew 5:21-37

Gospeler + The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. *People* Glory be to thee, O Lord.

esus said, "You have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not kill; and whoever kills shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that every one who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother shall be liable to the council, and whoever says, 'You fool!' shall be liable to the hell of fire. So if you are offering your gift at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Make friends quickly with your accuser, while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison; truly, I say to you, you will never get out till you have paid the last penny. You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that every one who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, pluck it out and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell. And

if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body go into hell. It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that every one who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, makes her an adulteress; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. Again you have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil."

A hymn that amplifies the Eucharistic postcommunion prayer "send us out into the world in peace...to love and serve the Lord," this hymn is a powerful statement of commitment to Christian service. This Morning's Liturgy

- † Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors which bedeck the altar and are worn by the clergy are colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season after Epiphany are traditionally green. Green is a color that naturally reminds us of hope and growth, and reflects the seasons of Spring and Summer in the natural world. The Church clothes herself in green vestments to express her joyous, lively hope of the ever lovely and eternally lush meadows of the Kingdom of God.
- † The organ music of César Franck marks the beginning of the French organ symphonic movement. The *Prélude en B Mineur* is beautiful in its utter simplicity. † *Then shall the righteous shine forth* is an excerpt from Mendelssohn's oratorio *Elijah*, written in 1846. This is a choral setting of the aria in which heavenly bodies encourage Elijah towards the end of his life, assuring him of the grandeur awaiting him after his Earthy work and death, coincidentally written only one year before Mendelssohn's own death. † A simple duet setting of a simple psalm, the melody of *Comfort*, *O Lord, the soul of Thy servant* was written at the same time as Mendelssohn's *Elijah*. They share some of the same stylistic characteristics of the time, mostly in their regular, succinct, and pleasantly resolving melodic phrases. He contributes a gentle harmony that provides motion and depth to the main melody.
