Behold, all souls are mine; the soul of the father as well as the soul of the son is mine: the soul that sins shall die. Yet you say, 'The way of the Lord is not just.' Hear now, O house of Israel: Is my way not just? Is it not your ways that are not just? When a righteous man turns away from his righteousness and commits iniquity, he shall die for it; for the iniquity which he has committed he shall die. Again, when a wicked man turns away from the wickedness he has committed and does what is lawful and right, he shall save his life. Because he considered and turned away from all the transgressions which he had committed, he shall surely live, he shall not die. Yet the house of Israel says, 'The way of the Lord is not just.' 

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. 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This Morning's Music

WILLIAM WALOND's earliest reference is as an organist at Oxford University, perhaps for a collegiate chapel or one of the local churches. He composed a set of six voluntaries, from which today's three are taken. They are for the "cornet" stop of the organ, a combination of 8',4', 2 2/3', 2', 1 3/5' pipes.

HENRY PURCELL was one of 8 children, whose father was a tenor in the choir of the Chapel Royal. At ten, Henry was admitted to the Chapel Royal Choir, and remained connected to it throughout his short life, both as a singer and composer. In 1679 he was appointed Organist of Westminster Abbey, a post he retained until his death. Purcell is buried beneath the organ case in the north aisle of the Abbey. Today's anthem is a verse anthem - meaning the music alternates between "verse" sections for soloists and the "full" sections for the choir. Purcell's church music was written before the age of 26, when he began to focus his attention to composing for the stage, which was much more profitable.

WILLIAM BYRD, whose 400th anniversary we honor this year, was one of the most significant composers of his era, being compared equally to Palestrina, Lassus and Victoria. Little is known of his parentage or early life. In 1563 he was appointed Organist of Lincoln Cathedral, and in 1570 a member of the Chapel Royal. In 1572 he was appointed co-organist of the Chapel Royal with Thomas Tallis. In 1575, Queen Elizabeth I granted Byrd and Tallis a 21 year monopoly on the printing of music and

music paper, which Byrd inherited on the death of Tallis in 1585. Byrd wrote masses, anthems, psalms, madrigals, music for viols and keyboard works.

This Morning's Liturgy

Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors which bedeck the altar and are worn by the clergy are colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season after Pentecost are traditionally green. Green is a color that naturally reminds us of hope and growth, and reflects the seasons of Spring and Summer in the natural world. The Church clothes herself in green vestments to express her joyous, lively hope of the ever lovely and eternally lush meadows of the Kingdom of God.
