

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we,

This Morning's Music

Felix Mendelssohn was born in Hamburg, Germany in 1809. His grandfather was the famous philosopher, Moses Mendelssohn, and his father was a banker. Felix studied music in Berlin, and by the age of 15 had composed a number of pieces, including a symphony and an opera. Mendelssohn traveled extensively from 1829-1832, spending time in Scotland and England, resulting in symphonies, overtures and his Song Without Words piano scores. In 1829 in Berlin he performed Bach's St Matthew Passion, first heard in 1729 and forgotten since Bach's death in 1750. The 6 Organ Sonatas were written in 1845 for publication in England.

William Walton was born in Oldham, England and was a chorister at Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. Today's anthem is one of the few pieces Walton wrote for the church, which include a Te Deum written for the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, and a setting of the morning canticles. He is most noted for his oratorio Belshazzar's Feast, as well as two symphonies, concertos for various instruments with orchestra and the opera Troilus and Cressida.

Sasha Johnson Manning is an active composer in England, primarily of choral works. She is connected to St Louis, through her friendship with Philip Barnes, the Director of the St Louis Chamber Chorus, who was a fellow musician with Sasha in Bowdon, England in their youth. Sasha has written a number of works for the Chamber Chorus, including a Requiem, which was heard on their most recent concert. Today's anthem was written for the St Peter's, Ladue, choir as a gift following their tour of cathedrals and the parish church in Bowdon, in August of 2000. Subsequently Manning has written a number of choral works for St Peter's, including an organ work for the dedication of the Mander Organ at St Peter's in 2001.

This Morning's Liturgy

Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors which bedeck the altar and are worn by the clergy are colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season after Pentecost are traditionally green. Green is a color that naturally reminds us of hope and growth, and reflects the seasons of Spring and Summer in the natural world. The Church clothes herself in green vestments to express her joyous, lively hope of the ever lovely and eternally lush meadows of the Kingdom of God.
