The Nicene Creed

This Morning's Music

Diderik Buxtehude was born in Oldesloe and died in Lubeck, Germany. He was one of the most famous organists of his day, inspiring J. S. Bach to journey 200 miles to hear his music and study with him. Buxtehude wrote a large amount of organ and choral music, of which today's Prelude is a good example.

Ned Rorem was born in Richmond, Indiana to a wealthy family. He began music studies at an early age, with further studies in Chicago, and at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia and at the Juilliard School in New York. He was a student of Aaron Copland and Virgil Thompson. Rorem lived in Paris following WWII where he began his extensive career of composing songs, instrumental and keyboard works. He also penned a famous series of diaries at this time. Rorem wrote music in almost every form and worked steadily until near the end of his life, at 99 years old.

Sigfrid Karg-Elert was born in Oberndorf and died in Leipzig, Germany. He studied at the Conservatory in Leipzig and later became a Professor there. Karg-Elert wrote a large amount of organ and instrumental music, much honored at the time. Today's Postlude is one of his most frequently played organ works.

This Morning's Liturgy

Colors play an important part in the worship of the Church. The colors which bedeck the altar and are worn by the clergy are colors worn in England before the Reformation. They change according to the seasons of the church year and the liturgical tasks at hand. The vestments worn in the season after Pentecost are traditionally green. Green is a color that naturally reminds us of hope and growth, and reflects the seasons of Spring and Summer in the natural world. The Church clothes herself in green vestments to express her joyous, lively hope of the ever lovely and eternally lush meadows of the Kingdom of God.
